## Clarence Brown Mainstage Features “A Christmas Carol”

November 27 thru December 22

“A Christmas Carol” is the story of Ebenezer Scrooge, whose ghostly journey and transformation through Christmas past, present and future is among the most beloved stories in western literature.

Described by Dickens as his “little Christmas book,” “A Christmas Carol” was first published in December 1843. The story was instantly successful, selling over 6,000 copies in one week. It has since been republished countless times and adapted for stage and screen. It remains one of literatures’ most enduring and often-quoted stories of hope, triumph, and communal spirit.

This year’s production at the Clarence Brown Theatre features an enhanced set, more music and will include an intermission. Also new this year will be a special photo opportunity and sweet treat concessions for young and old alike. The production is sponsored by mainstage series sponsor, Schaad Companies and the Arts and Heritage Fund. Hotel support is provided by the Hilton Garden Inn. Media sponsors are WBIR, Comcast, WUOT, WUTK, Knoxville News Sentinel, East TN PBS, and B97.5.

Director Casey Sams is an Associate Professor at UT where she works in both the Graduate and Undergraduate programs teaching Movement and Acting. Casey’s other CBT credits include: “Sweeney Todd,” “On the Razzle,” and “Tommy.” She also has directed, choreographed or served as movement coach at such theatres as The Round House Theatre (DC), The Utah Shakespearean Festival, PlayMakers Rep (Chapel Hill), North Carolina stage Company (Asheville), Virginia Stage Company (Norfolk), Knoxville Opera Company, and Vermont Stage Company (Burlington).

“What excites me about “A Christmas Carol” and one of the areas we will be focusing on is the real sense that Scrooge is going on an individual journey . . . that it’s his trip from being closed off and isolated from

the world around him to a place where he can see and share in the beauty, generosity, and joy that is around him,” Sams said.

Rachel Schlafer-Parton (Musical Director) from Luttrell, TN is best known for her performance on the syringe on Garrison Keillor’s “A Prairie Home Companion.” She also performed at the National Gallery of Art, Strathmore Music Center, Bonnaroo, and the Bluebird Café. Locally she has performed with Farr Horizons, Knoxville Early Music Project, InterAct Children’s Theatre for the Deaf, Hudson K, and The Band of Humans. Her CBT credits include: “A Christmas Carol” and “The Story of Opal.”

The production features professional actors and resident artists, UT Theatre faculty, UT graduate and undergraduate student actors, and actors from greater Knoxville.

Again, performing the role of Scrooge is visiting guest actor David Kortemeier. Some CBT credits include: “Sweeney Todd,” “Moonlight & Magnolias,” “The Music Man,” “Man of La Mancha,” “Amadeus,” “Oedipus the King,” “Little Shop of Horrors,” and “Love’s Labour’s Lost.” His work also has been seen at the Repertory Theatre of St. Louis, the Great Lakes Theatre Festival in Cleveland, Drury Lane Theatre and Noble Fool Theatricals in Chicago and thirteen seasons with the Illinois Shakespeare Festival in Bloomington. He holds an MFA in Acting from the University of Louisville.

## Christmas in Old Appalachia

December 7, 2013 – December 24, 2013

Popcorn balls and paper chains, fruits and nuts in their stockings, carols by the fire, a cedar tree cut in the nearby woods — that's the Christmas most rural Appalachian children knew.

And it's the Christmas we recreate each year throughout the Museum village at our special Christmas in Old Appalachia. Join us as we recreate a meaningful holiday of simpler pleasures and homier joys. Traditional trees and homemade decorations, typical of austere pioneer days, transform the Museum's authentic log buildings; and in the one-room, dirt-floored Dan'l Boone cabin, strings of popcorn and cotton bolls circle a dormant tree. Paper chains and other ornaments trim the tree in the Little Tater Valley Schoolhouse.

Sweet gum and sycamore balls are strung throughout the Mark Twain Family Cabin, and a traditional silver star tops a native red cedar Christmas tree in the turn-of-the-century Peters Homestead House. Apples, nuts, homemade toys, and oranges fill stockings hung in the cabins.

Sing Christmas carols along with musicians in the Homestead House, where they'll be singing holiday and traditional songs every day during December. Sit and visit with the kids over some hot chocolate and Christmas cookies from the Museum Restaurant.

Pick up some stocking stuffers in the Museum Gift and Antique Shop, which features everything from hand-crafted ornaments, locally made muscadine and moonshine jellies, and beautiful pottery, along with baskets, quilts, and plenty of Appalachian specialties. Or just come relax in a rocking chair by the cozy, crackling fire in the big stone fireplace.

This has become the rallying cry for Jonathan Richard Cring, author and columnist at [www.jonathots.com](http://www.jonathots.com) for a program he is offering during this festive holiday season.

“There should be one month of the year when politics and arguing stop and we allow the best parts of our childhood traditions to merge with the better parts of our faith to give us a joyful experience,” says Mr. Cring from his journeys on the road.

Janet Clazzy is an award-winning musician—not only a master on the oboe but also an impresario on the WX-5 Wind Machine, which offers the audience the experience of 250 different instruments.

“When Jonathan and I get together playing with his keyboard and my magical horn, it’s like you’ve got a whole orchestra cooking up some great seasonal tunes—much to everybody’s glee.”

The Christmas tour will begin in Nashville, Tennessee, and will land in Miami just prior to Christmas morning. Everybody is invited to an evening of inspiration, deliciously “pepperminted” with entertainment.

Mr. Cring concludes, “We understand that people have a lot to do, getting ready for all the fun around the tree. But it wouldn’t hurt to take one hour to come out and give yourself a good one this year—because I surely believe we could use one.”

A free-will donation will be collected to defray expenses, and Mr. Cring and Ms. Clazzy will also offer a reasonable package of Christmas treasures to be enjoyed by the audience—or given as gifts to friends.

## Jazz Lunch at the Square Room


### *Tribute to Vince Guaraldi*

## *Fantasy of Lights Christmas Parade*

Gatlinburg's 38th annual Fantasy of Lights Christmas Parade travels through downtown Gatlinburg on Friday, December 6 starting at 7:30 p.m. to the cheers of an anticipated crowd of more than 80,000 spectators.

The parade excitement for young and old also includes more than 100 parade entries, over a dozen marching bands from Tennessee, North Carolina, Virginia, Georgia, and Alabama, and giant helium balloons taking to the streets.

The parade begins at Traffic Light #1A on Hwy 321 at 7:30 p.m. and ends about an hour-and-a-half later at Traffic Light #10.

Jamming sidewalks and balconies along the parade route, a large crowd will be able to soak up the illuminating glow of Gatlinburg Winter Magic, the City of Gatlinburg's popular holiday lights program which has received a \$1.6 million injection of new displays plus a 100-percent conversion to energy-efficient LED bulbs over the past few years.
